

From the Mayor's Desk

The Mayor's First year

When I was running for mayor of Cross Roads last year, I made it clear that I supported the major objectives that the past mayor and most of the town council had also supported over the last nine years. They are:

1 - One acre minimum lot size. This is important to maintain the quality of life that is a large step above what is found in high density developments throughout the state, and to keep the costs of town services to citizens to a minimum.

2- No property tax. The town administration should have the ability to control the costs to meet the citizens' needs at no cost to them. Cross Roads is in a commercial corridor, and if

properly administered, should get income from sales tax and fees.

3- No debt. Borrowed money costs not only the expense of the project for which it was borrowed, but also interest on the loan. It is the opinion of your mayor that this is not what the citizens of Cross Roads want.

4- Acceptable roads. Roads can always be improved and rarely do two people agree on exactly what should be done to the roads at any one time. Cross Roads has a history of very responsible road committees, and the roads are presently acceptable and upgrading continues under the scrutiny of the current competent road committee.

Obviously these are not the only important objectives to support the needs of our citizens, but I think they are the most important. The following subjects will show how the town is supporting these objectives and others of importance to the town.

2011 Financial Performance

For the first nine months of Cross Roads' 2011 fiscal year, the town has received \$33,000 more income than was budgeted

(11%). The increase was in both sales tax and fees categories. Expenses were \$93,000 below budget (31%). Performance of the Town Staff and Council has been outstanding in holding these costs down.

Pottershop Road Upgrade

As you remember from the previous issue of the Cross Roads Times, our town, along with Denton County,

agreed to share the cost of upgrading the drainage and surfacing of Pottershop Road. The cost of the project was estimated at \$192,000. The town has now received quotes from five different contractors and selected the lowest from Advanced Paving, a contractor that we have used previously. The total cost of the project, including engineering and supervision, is now estimated at \$175,000 or \$17,000 below the original estimate. When your mayor met with Hugh Coleman, our County Commissioner, he expressed his appreciation for this savings and said that the County's half of the savings could be added to any grants for which Cross Roads qualifies in 2012.

Jason Pool, our town engineer, said the Pottershop Road upgrade should start on August 1, 2011, and be completed by August 15, 2011.

Wal-Mart and the old Allegiance Development

Anything we can say about this development is speculative, but here is the latest news. Remember that the original developer went bankrupt because of the downturn in the economy. BBSSI, the banking operation that supported the development, is trying to get as much of their investment back as possible. I do not have any exact numbers on financing or what

they want back, but fully understand that they will try to get as much of the loan back as possible. The way to do this is to find a developer that will buy the property at a price acceptable to BBSSI and continue with the development.

Several possible developers have come and gone. According to the latest information we have, there is one that is close to purchasing the property, and there also is a backup. This is good since it came from both BBSSI and the developer. The town plays a role in this since we have and can approve state agreements to reimburse developers for part of their development cost from sales tax rebates. It is important that we do our best to get this development going, because it can mean additional sales tax income for the town.

AT&T Fiber Optics Installations

Fiber optic installation and activation have been completed from Hwy 380 down to Pottershop Road and across Tips to Keyes. Citizens in that area should be able to contact AT&T to initiate hook-up, if desired. Following completion of that project, AT&T has now been laying fiber optics down Keyes Lane to Oak Shores. The best estimate of installation completion is July 23, 2011. Following the completion of the installation, activation will

probably take another month, so actual use will begin in late September. It makes sense that once activation is complete AT&T will be promoting sign-up for the service, but no commitment has been made yet.

Elections and Committees

As you can see elsewhere in this publication, Larry Fisher and Steve Smith have been re-elected as members of Cross Roads Council. Wally Kille has been added to the Council to fill the seat that Virden Seybold has vacated. Official installation was made at the June council meeting. In addition to congratulations for those elected, the mayor and council expressed their appreciation to Virden Seybold for his contributions over the past ten years on Town Council.

In addition to acceptance of the elected officials, it is important that the 2011-2012 Commissions and Committees be recognized. I am convinced that the economy is turning around. For that reason, the leadership and contributions of the town committees are critical to our town's future. Space does not allow me to list all of the members here, but it is important that the committees be recognized.

RESOLUTION AND ORDINANCE QUARTERLY UPDATE

1. Town Council adopted Ordinance # 2011-0627-01 Amending Ordinance #2010-0816-02 The 2010 - 2011 Fiscal Year Budget by moving \$100,000.00 from reserves to match funds granted to the Town of Cross Roads from Denton County to make drainage and road improvements to Pottershop Road.
2. Town Council adopted Ordinance # 2011-627-02 Amending Section 502.2.2 of the International Energy Conservation Code, 2003 edition, to allow the use of R6 duct insulation in both supply and return ducts where the building envelope demonstrates compliance of at least 10% better than code. (This amendment was recommended by our Building Official Rodney Patterson. If you have any question please contact Town Hall.)
3. Town Council approved Resolution # 2011-0627-01 Canvassing the May 14, 2011 Election returns.

FALL ROADSIDE CLEANUP

The fall Roadside Cleanup will take place Saturday, October 8th. Please plan to participate. We will have a large roll-off container provided by IESI, the town's waste collection contractor. Landscape debris and other disposal items that are not recyclable will be accepted. Alan and Naomi Hauf will be hosting a hot dog roast in the Town Park at 1:00 PM so please plan to attend.

TOWN ELECTIONS

If you are not aware, the Town re-elected Steve Smith and Larry Fisher and also elected Wally Kille to the Town Council. Thank you to all who ran for office and willingly offered their dedication to serve this community.

UNDERSTANDING COMMON CODE VIOLATIONS AND ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE

The Town of Cross Roads has adopted Town Codes (laws) specifically designed to address health and safety issues, nuisances, and to maintain a clean environment for all citizens in our community. Town of Cross Roads does this by working in partnership with the people of Cross Roads.

Code Enforcement responds to concerns from citizens that affect the quality of life within the Town, such as zoning, overgrown lots or yards, inoperative vehicles, maintenance of structures, illegal signs, and public nuisances. Each quarter I will highlight one common code violation.

Junked Vehicle. A vehicle that is self-propelled and:

- (1) Does not have lawfully attached to it:
 - (A) An unexpired license plate; or
 - (B) A valid motor vehicle inspection certificate;
- (2) Is wrecked, dismantled or partially dismantled, or discarded; or
- (3) Is inoperable and has remained inoperable for more than:
 - (A) 72 consecutive hours, if the vehicle is on public property; or
 - (B) 30 consecutive days, if the vehicle is on private property.



The term "junked vehicle" does not include (1) a vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property, (2) a vehicle or part thereof which is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or junkyard, or (3) an unlicensed, operable or inoperable antique and special interest vehicle stored by a collector on his property, provided that the vehicle and the outdoor storage area are maintained in such a manner that they do not constitute a health hazard and are screened from ordinary public view by means of a fence, rapidly growing trees, shrubbery or other appropriate means.

Code Section 8.03 Junk Motor Vehicles

What should you do if you receive a yellow door-hanger warning sticker?

If you receive a yellow door hanger warning sticker, this indicates your property has been inspected by the code officer. Any violations found on your property will be noted on the card or sticker; if you have questions please contact the Town Hall.

Fiber-Optic U-Verse ...by Bill Bacon

New high speed internet, phone and television is coming soon to the south side of Cross Roads, TX. In order to provide U-Verse to this area, AT&T is running fiber optic cable to the big green phone substation at Tipps and Keyes. From there, this service will run through the standard copper phone lines to your home. You must be within 3500 feet of the substation to receive service. This footage includes not only the actual copper wire length leading to your home, but also wiring within your home where new components will be installed by an AT&T technician.

You may have the choice of television, internet, or landline phone service, or any combination of these. Depending on the distance to your home, not all of these options may be available. When AT&T U-Verse became available at Arvin Hill and New Hope just north of Cross Roads, AT&T sent

out solicitors to sign up the nearby residents. The solicitor scheduled a date for a technician to check the home for eligibility. This technical visit is free of charge, and the technician will inform you which services are available for your home. As an example, our home was just a little too far away to receive the television option, but we currently are enjoying internet and the landline phone U-Verse services.

Once you decide which services you like, the technician needs to alter a phone jack inside the home, and run a line to a new device or devices (wireless gateway, battery backup, DVR or standard receiver), to decode the various signals. In our case, we now have an internet wireless gateway and a back-up battery for the phone service. For

additional security, we turned off their unsecured wireless functionality and plugged our existing secured wireless router into it.

As expected, the more services and options you select, the more expensive the monthly bill. **Internet** download speed options are 3 meg, 6 meg, 12 meg, and 24 meg.

For **television**, AT&T needs to guarantee a 30 meg download speed. There are multiple television packages available. The **landline phone** service is

a Voice-Over-IP (VOIP) feature. Many of the standard phone options are included, such as: voice mail, caller id, three-way calling, call forwarding, unlimited national long distance service, etc.

We chose the 12 meg download internet speed. We are able to easily watch two different streaming movies concurrently, or just as easily have multiple active internet connections.


